Springtime in Kentucky is the perfect time to get outside and start your home garden. A few tasks will help you have a successful season.

Planning your garden on paper before you begin allows you to visualize the plants you want to grow and when they

will be ready to harvest. Next, select a good gardening site. Plan a site in full sun, relatively level, well-drained, close to a water source and

dries quickly from morning dew. You may need to get a soil test to best prepare the soil. Add fertilizer according to soil test results.

Remember to only plan a garden as large as you can easily maintain. Beginning gardeners often overplant and fail because they can't keep up with the required tasks. You must manage weeds and pests and apply water so your plants will be ready to harvest on time.

A few other important tips:

- 1. Grow vegetables that will produce the maximum amount of food in your available space.
- 2. Plant during the correct season for the crop.
- Choose varieties recommended for Kentucky. 3.
- Harvest vegetables at their proper stage of maturity. Consider how you will store them if you don't use them right away.



We often receive financial advice about the importance of retirement planning but less about what to do with our money once retirement arrives. If you are retired or will be soon, here are some tips to make your money go further. Create a budget. Knowing how much money you have coming and going is a simple but important concept. First, consider all income sources. This includes Social Security benefits, employer-sponsored benefit plans and personal investments for many people.

Next, review your monthly expenses. Expenses include those that are fixed, like a mortgage or car payment, as well flexible expenses like groceries and utilities. You should also consider annual occasional expenses, like birthday gifts or vacations. Costs associated with new or continued hobbies may fit into the occasional expenses category. A key to financial health is understanding and controlling where your money goes. Compare income to expenses to make sure ends meet. This will let you know if you are on target when creating monthly and annual budgets that work for your retirement income. ou may find, especially if there are rising inflation rates, that your retirement income will not last as many years as you originally intended. This could require you to reduce your spending in some areas or get a post-retirement job to generate additional income.

2023 Sweet Potato Slips Order

*Beauregard—\$90/1,000 slips A bushy, vine-type sweet potato with rose-colored skin and a light, moist, orange flesh. It resists cracking and is an excellent yielder with a 90 day growing season. Long time favorite.

*Orleans—\$90/1,000 slips Very similar to Beauregard in appearance with same great flavor, but noted for more uniform potatoes. North Carolina producers are replacing Beauregard with Orleans due to consistency in shape leading to better market sales.

*White Bonita—\$90/1,000 slips White variety, great flavor! Replaces O'Henry. It is a good yielder with a growing season of 100 days.

*Covington—\$90/1,000 slips A favorite commercial bushy variety, that is very uniform in shape with exceptional results. A high-quality eating potato with rose-colored skin that is slightly darker than Beauregard and a moist, orange flesh. 120 days

* Murasaki-\$90/1,000 slips Purple skin with white flesh. 120 day growing season.



Easy Tortilla Breakfast Pizza



- Nonstick cooking spray
- 1 (8 inch) whole-wheat tortilla
- 1 cup spinach
- 3 medium eggs
- 1/2 medium tomato, diced
- Dash of salt and pepper
- 1/4 cup shredded part-skim mozzarella cheese
- 1. Wash hands with warm water and soap, scrubbing for at least 20 seconds.
- **2.** Spray a 10-inch skillet with nonstick spray and place tortilla inside.
- 3. Place spinach over the tortilla and make three slight wells with spinach. Crack an egg into each well so that it can be cut into three triangles once done.

- Sprinkle tomatoes, salt, pepper, and mozzarella over the eggs.
- Cover with lid and cook on mediumlow heat for 12 minutes, or until egg yolk is cooked through.
- Remove from heat and slice into three wedges with one egg each to serve.
- **7.** Store leftovers in the refrigerator within 2 hours.
